## Respect and inferiority are conditional

It is processed subjectively and objectively in the brain depending on the following circumstances

- (1) Hierarchical relationships in society
- 1 When judged by comparing years of service
- (2) Mid-career recruitment
- (2) Environments unrelated to oneself
- ③Entertainment industry/specialized skill occupations
- (3) Intimate relationship environment
- 4 Parents, siblings, and children
- (5) Couples/lovers

- $\textcircled{1} \cdot \cdot \cdot$  There is a possibility that some feelings of inferiority may arise, but there is a high degree of acceptability.
- $@\cdot \cdot \cdot \mathsf{Compared}$  to @, the degree is considerably lower
- \* Transfer of skilled users/your own transfer
- ④Even if you are in the same industry, it is a completely different field (the possibility is close to zero)
- $\textcircled{4}\cdot \cdot \cdot$  High degree due to the relaxing space

However, this may be different for grandparents.

 $\bigcirc$  · · · In a sense, it is a third-party position, and it can also be seen as bragging, so the degree is reversed.

If I were to become a kindergarten teacher...

- ① Memorize all three basic articles of the Japanese Constitution by the time of graduation
- ② English conversation at a daily conversation level.
- ③ Basic PC skills.
- 4 Music (piano) playing and note reading.
- (5) Basic physical fitness and flexibility exercises.
