- ② Saxophone
- ③ Violin
- 4 Composing
- ①, ③, and ④ are all subjects covered by the entrance exam, while ② is not.

 The most important things are "reading notation" and "music theory."

 Even if I take the piano performance exam, I can't choose the pieces I'm good at, so
- *Playing the piano while looking at sheet music
- *And another "instrumental" or "vocal"

While you can take the exam with the above two qualifications, the first exam is incredibly difficult, consisting of a "desktop test" and "performance from sheet music."

It seems that not all professional pianists, violinists, and cellists graduate from music colleges. For example, pianist Hayato Kadono, who appears in my YouTube videos, graduated from the University of Tokyo's Faculty of Engineering and then the University of Tokyo's Graduate School of Information Processing Engineering, not from a music college. Each person is different, and I've heard that more piano teachers at school are likely to be music college graduates.

If I were to take the music college entrance exam, I would:

- ①Graduate from Kinki University, Faculty of Law, Department of Law
- ② Graduate from Sompo University (a private university with qualifications) (Total + Planner)
- ③Currently studying at Seisa University, Faculty of Coexistence, Department of Coexistence Science, High School/Junior High School English Teacher Training Course Since I graduated from ① above, I am currently a fourth-year student transferring in the third year.

- * Dropped out of Shiseido Gakuen Cosmetology School
- * Summer online course experience at the State University of New York at Albany Law School
